Personal Information

I lived in Austinville, Virginia with my parents and a younger sister and brother. I went to Austinville Elementary School, Jackson Memorial High School and graduated in the second graduating class of Fort Chiswell High School. Married my high school sweetheart and we have been married for 57 years. While at home I helped with feeding hogs, milking cows and other chores such as working in the garden. My father was

self-employed and spread lime for farmers. While at home I would get early, feed the hog, milk the cow and take my father's truck to the lime pile to be loaded. I was usually first in line where I waited for the lime pile to open. This is where I did most of my school homework.

We have two children. One lives in Dublin and one lives in Kingsport, Tennessee. We have 5 grandchildren, 3 living in Pulaski County, one in Wytheville and one in Texarkana, Texas. We had one grandchild, Abigail who did not survive as an infant. We have one great grandson who lives with his parents in Pulaski. During the time I was in college my wife worked to support us during this time and we also had a child to support. We had to manage our finances very carefully to keep food on the table. I ate a lot of homemade pizza and spaghetti. We weren't going to starve since our parents were supportive but you are always too proud to ask for help.

Our first child was born in Riverside Hospital in Newport News, Virginia where I worked with the Newport News Shipbuilding and Dry Dock Company.
